Wacousta

The town was at first called Waterloo and was formed by the Waterloo Joint Stock Company in 1837. Soon a sawmill, gristmill, general store, and boarding house was erected. The name was changed to Wacousta in 1848 for a fictious Indian maiden as there was already a Waterloo post office in Michigan.

A part of the Wacousta General Store was originally on the banks of the Looking Glass River and used as a trading post.

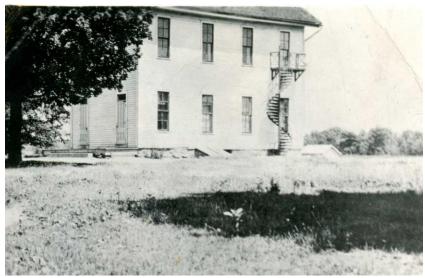
The Wacousta-DeWitt Masonic Hall was built about 1860 as a hotel and tavern.

By 1880 the town had two general stores, a grocery, a drug store, a sawmill, and a gristmill.

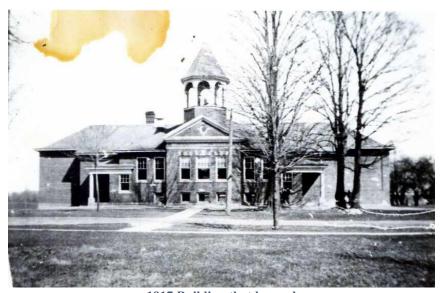


Wacousta-DeWitt Masonic Hall

The first school took place in 1839 in a town store. In 1844 a frame school house was built. This was replaced with a two-story building in 1870. That building was torn down and replaced in 1917 with a brick building. It burned in 1924 and a new brick building was opened in 1926. It is now a community center.

The district joined Grand Ledge in 1958. The school building was used as an elementary school until the new elementary was built in the 1970's.
