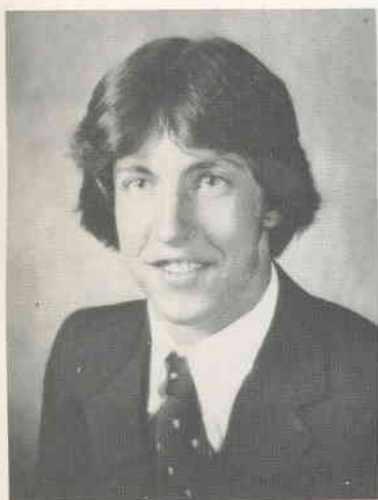
"Will the prosecution please call its first witness?" Bringing back memories of those "historic" trials is Gov-

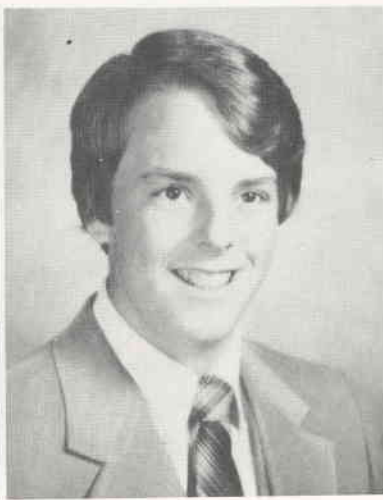

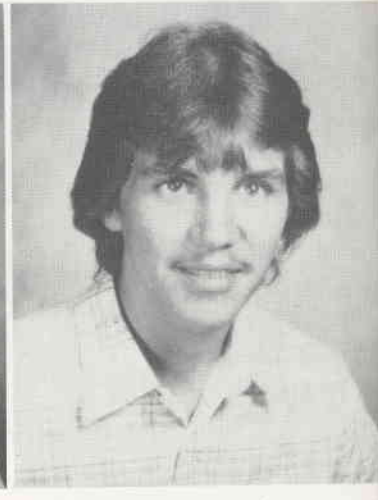
