"I plan on living at home for awhile, then on campus," said Kelly Brown.

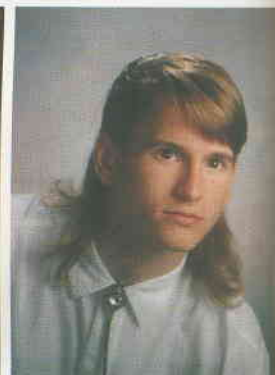
Living on campus was a typical budgetary decision. Some seniors planned on living at home if the college of their choice was nearby, while others were still going to live on campus.

Instead of college some are planning to work first.

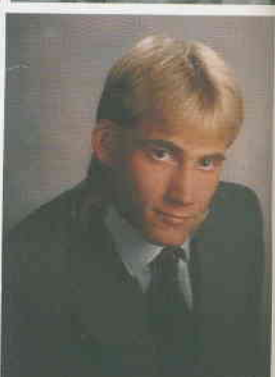
"I either plan on working and saving for college and/or moving to California. College is definitely in the future, but not for another year of two," said Craig Porubsky.
