COMPILATION OF SCHOOL MATERIALS FINISHED

A compilation of public school related materials at the Archives of the Clinton County Historical Society has been completed recently. Two large sets of statistical reports, listing teachers and school board members have been indexed. All the school photos in the archive's possession have been mounted in acid-free sleeves, identified when possible, and indexed. School related news clippings and memorabilia have been sorted, indexed and when desirable and practical, encapsulated in acid-free material for preservation.

As a result of the compilation project, a long list of Clinton County rural schools and their location has been developed. This should be helpful to researchers pressed for time and short on clues who are trying to pinpoint a particular school community.

Approximately 140 rural school names are listed. It was interesting to note that three schools named "Grove" existed in the county, In Essex, Victor and WAtertown townships. There were two "Sage" schools, one in Bingham and one in Dallas; two "Brown" schools, one in Eagle and one in Olive; two "Allen" schools, one in Lebanon and one in Watertown; two "Clark" schools, one in Bath and one in Watertown. There also existed "Brick" and "Little Brick"; "Red School House" and "Old Red".

Ever alert, Wilma Soule spotted the following regarding Union School in St. Johns in the microfilmed newspapers: CLINTON REPUBLICAN - 8 June, 1866 -page 3, Column 1: "Baby Cribs" Would it not be advisable for the school board of this village to procure a number of baby cribs and nurses for the junior department

of the Union School? If the room was supplied with these conveniences, it would be a greater inducement for the parents to sent their infants to the institution in order that they may have them nursed and properly cared for at the expense of the district! The average daily attendance in this department is about 75 children, whose ages range from 3 to 8 years—all under the immediate charge of one teacher! If the board concludes to get a supply of baby cribs for the department, we shall announce the fact through these columns in order that parents may govern their action accordingly.
