THE HICKS MANSION

The State Journal November, 1973

The old wooden doors of the Hicks mansion in St. Johns, with their hand cut frosted glass, are a bulwark against the changes of time. For 100 years they have stood fast against the pressures of two centuries, the new trying to supplant the old.

The old doors have won their battle, and walking into the mansion is like walking back into the Victorian era, with fringe and fancy-legged furniture.

It was a time when wealthy men built opulent houses and flaunted their gardens and running waterfalls. All that the house represents has survived the passage of time and in fact, is improving every day.

Room by room, the mansion is being renovated by its two new owners, Doug Carpenter and Morris Apple. Floors and walls are being stripped and redone with new paper and paint and period antiques are being sought to fill the large rooms.

"The house was built in 1873 by a man from Canada," said Carpenter. He came to St. Johns when the railroad did."

When the 20 room mansion was built by John Hicks, he had already amassed fortunes in the lumber and retail trade business. The house shows his close relationship to the lumber industry. The nuge beams that support the third floor must have come from unusually large trees.

The house has seven bedrooms, five bathrooms, and a large roomy kitchen. The kitchen was remodeled two or three decades ago, to the dismay of the new owners. They intend to put it back to 19th century style as soon as possible.

Working together, the two men have managed to finish redecorating the huge 15 by 33 foot living room. They have researched every fixture that came with the house down to the tile on the fireplaces. The house has five fireplaces with various types of tile.

The dining room was the next room finished. Its draperies are designed after those in the White House. The massive table and buffet server is a remnant of the Olds days and is the only furniture that came with the house.

They are in the process of redecorating the Gold Room, a small living room that has a floor to ceiling gilt mirror at least 110 years old.

All in all, the house lives up to claims made by the Detroit Daily Post on May 30, 1873. John Hicks is building a fine two story brick home at an estimated cost of \$15,000. When finished it will be the finest in the county.
