OUR GENEALOGY BRANCH IS AT THE "ROOTS ". OF IT ALL

Since man drew pictures of his hunts on his cave walls, his own personal history has been of great interest to him. Genealogists are modern day personal historians. The serach for their own beginnings. This personal history brings to the genealogist his ancestors which also informs him of the area and the times in which the ancestor lived. To not consider genealogy a part of history is a mistake. This is the most personal history of man.

Our Genealogy Branch dedicates
itself to making ancestor scarches
to beginners a "possible" project.
They also help those who are
"stuck" at some point in their
search. Often a few clues or
references will help. Extensive
help is given by these experiences
genealogists.

Another phase of the committee's work is the preservation
of records. Of course they know
that these records will be of help
to future "roots" seckers. The
group has indexed the three
Clinton County Atlases from 1874,
1896, and 1915. They have liter-

PIONEER AVIATOR, PHILIP PARMALEE TO BE TOPIC OF MARCH HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEETING

On March 9 the annual meeting of the Clinton County Historical Society will be held in the Municipial Building Auditorium in St. Johns at 8:00p.m. This meeting is being held one week earlier than usual.

The program this month will be about Clinton pioneer aviator Philip Parmalce, the early 1900's pilot who first flew with Orville and Wilbur Wright. His work with the Army Aircorps helped develop aerial bombing. His distinguised career was cut short when he was killed in an airplane crash.

Shirley Parber, of our Society and the Secretary of the Clinton County Historical Commission, discovered Parmalee when she was doing research on another project. She became interested in the references to his life and began a study of his life and times. She felt that more people should know about this man and wrote several articles about him for local papers. Her efforts were read by Parmalee's sister and she contacted Shirley. She had collected Philip's trophics. letters and memorbilia. These will be brought to the meeting by Philip's sister. The life: and times of Philip Parmalee will be discussed.
