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Paine-Gillam-Scott Museum to open

The anxiously awaited opening of the Paine-Gillum-Scott 1860 House is at hand. Society members and special guests will meet at noon Sunday, May 20 to officially open the new museum at 106 Maple Street on the Court House Square, St. Johns.

Congressman Don Albosta and local officials will attend. The Clinton County Historical Commission will present a resolution.

The historic home has been restored to its 1890 remodeling with more than 2,000 hours of volunteer labor. Directors John and Catherine Rumbaugh and assistants Robert and Lee Walling have led the volunteer crew.

Restoration, though not yet finished, has curned the old red building, discarded by the Mid-Michigan Health Department, into a new monument for Clinton County.

The moon opening will extend to 4 p.m. the first day. Other hours will continue through Michigan Week, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. each day extending until 8 p.m. on Friday.

Demonstrations in pioneer crafts and lore are spotted through the week as people are invited to come and visit.

Chaffee at dedication

Donald L. Chaffee, father of space pioneer Roger Chaffee, will present a historical marker honoring Philip Parmelee, aeronautical pioneer at Capital City Airpor May 19. Chaffee will help dedicate the Parmelee marker at the noon kick-off activi for a two-day Air Show in Lansing. Like Parmelee, Chaffee's son was a fatality of twork they both loved. Roger Chaffee was on three astronauts killed in a flash fire aboat test flight of Appollo I at Cape Kennedy, 1967.

The Parmelee marker is a beautiful two sided bronze plaque that incorporates photographs as part of the text. An official State of Michigan historical information simarker, it is sponsored by the Clinton Co. Historical Commission. Freeman McClintock Lansing (who was present the day Parmelee crashed in Calif.) donated funds to help pefor the marker.

The Air Show celebration is free and we continue all afternoon and again Sunday with parachute jumping, flight acrobatics and ground displays of experimental homemade at craft.

Old cemetary at Alward

In Section 20 of Olive Township a small and unique cemetery can be found. Now know as the Alward Lake Cemetery it was original part of the Nathan Smith farm and called the Smith Cemetery. The land for it was given about 1750 when a member of the Smith familiated. The site straddled DeWitt Road with side used for Indian busials and the other whites and Catholics (the Smith family fait Markers were wooded and soon gone but the cemetery was filled. There were no lots plated out, so burials were made where ever a family chose.

In 1902 an association was formed to c for the cemetery; the women held quilting parties and sold quilts for funds. The Lad group disbanded in 1946 and later the towns started to care for cemeteries.

At present this cemetery is about a one one side of the road and has 23 stones left.
