In the wake of the successful grand opening of the Paine-Gillam-Scott 1890 House, the directors John and Catherine Rumbaugh and Bob and Lee Walling issue a reminder that restoration is not yet complete and help is still badly needed.

They are thankful for the help the crew of volunteers gave, helping them log the 2,700 hour that went into transforming the old Mid-Michigan Health Dept. building into the beautiful house museum that 1,500 visitors toured for Michigan Week.

The showing was very successful with tour guides for special groups to show off the newly finished parts of the restoration and explain the tremendous chores that went into the project. The unfinished kitchen, which is the next big job, served as a reminder of what had been accomplished.

Besides the kitchen restoration work orass door knobs need to be polished back to their original shine; new donations need to be logged and readied for display; the eternal job of cleaning is always present as well as typing and office work.

We also hope that you will encourage families whom you know who are recent residents to include their histories as well. If we had seen only pioneer families in the first history of the county, many of our own ancestors would not have been included. Todays' recent residents are the ancestors of tomorrow.

Perhaps you are wondering why a form is used. We want the information about each family to be similar and therefore following the form has helped. The story however, is of each family and really tells about that family only. If your church, fraternal organization, or civic group has not yet sent in information, please make certain that they do. The responsibility of each of us in the Society is to get as much information in this book as possible. Make sure that your groups are in the book. Current and past businesses are also a part of the story of Clinton County. Help us find these too.

If you would care to give this book as a gift or would like one yourself it is possible to order a book now. The pre-publication price is \$30.50 (Think of that as a tank of gasoline if your car is a large one) and these books will be imprinted with a number corresponding to the order in which they are sold. Only those sold before printing will be so imprinted so that would make a nice gift. We are putting the money for the pre-publication books in a savings account so that we will have a little interest gathered before publication. DO YOU KNOW that the actual restoration cost of the Paine-Gillam-Scott house museum was only \$608? Much equipment and supplies were donated for the work project. Total expenditures from October included utilities, office supplies, furnishings, legal and insurance, educational training and collection maintenance and totaled \$2,604.49.

DO YOU KNOW that the Genealogy Committee is working in cemeteries at North Eagle, East Plains, Bath, Fowler. Catholic, St. Mary's of Westphalia and others, recording tombstone inscriptions?
