Restoration committee is April program in DeWitt

The monthly meeting of the Clinton County Historical Society has been postponed until the last Thursday of the month, April 30th, when members will meet at the new Community Church at 505 Webb Road, DeWitt, for a program by the Historic Buildings and Restoration committee.

Chairman Ken Coin refers to his committee as the "old building committee" and they are interested in authentic restorations of the county's historic homes. He said their program will be a chronological presentation of typical buildings, both homes and commercial in the DeWitt area.

Museum donations can mark special events

Included with your newsletter this month is a "Rememberance" envelope that can be used for seven different occasions, memorial, weddings, anniversaries, births, other occasions and "Friends of the Museum"donations. More are available at the museum and they make very nice gifts and help the museum build its collection at the same time.

April exhibits at museum are varied

There are some varied and interesting exhibits at the museum this month. A display of itique cameras has been set up and the St. Johns Camera Club is helping make prints of some very old glass negatives recently donated to the museum. They will be on display by the middle of the month.

The Morning Musicale Club from St. Johns has the diningroom at the museum this month, and they have arranged it with a collection of antique music. They are the sponsoring group for the annual Magnolia Week celebration which starts Sunday, May 3. The museum will be open from 1 to 5 p.m. Tea will be served Wednesday, May 6 from 2 to 5 p.m. and a special slide show of the antique art of area artists featured in last year's Magnolia Week display will be shown in the evening. Magnolia Week coincides with National Music Week.

The museum will be open for special hours on Saturday, May 9, from 1 to 5 p.m.

Victor Township is on display in the township room. Three items from this exhibit have been left to the museum; a beautiful marble top table, a quilt top made by the Reed Cemetery Association and a small spinning wheel.

Of special interest is an exhibit from Holy Trinity Church in Fowler in honor of its 100th anniversary. On loan until the middle of June, when the church plans its centennial

celebration, is a carved wooden baptismal font made in 1916.

Members will be interested in another gift recently acquired by the museum which puts its giver on the \$1,000 board. A black walnut secretary made in 1870 for Orin Peck is now in place in the library area. The desk was made in Maple Rapids by the Hewitt Company which specialized in beds and tables. The special piece is signed by the carpenter. Also part of the gift is a most facinating brass student lamp, 20 old books and a chair.

Plans are being made for Michigan Week, which runs the whole month of May at the museum. School groups come through for special tours and clubs are also welcome if they make an appointment. These activities will start after Magnolia Week.

April 27 - May 3 is National Volunteer Week: Many thanks to the volunteers who help staff the museum for regular and special tours. The society is most appreciative of your help.

From the geneaologists

The Cenealogists have found a home and are in the process of setting up a County Archives at 117 E. Walker St., St. Johns, next to the fire station.

The spot has been donated by Jerry Idle of Owosso and will be used to house and preserve

Clinton County's old records.

The new archives will not only serve as a place to store records but will serve as a library and fact finding center for genealogical and historical purposes, according to Arland Cantz. Restoration files, oral history tapes, family histories and records, old photographs; all will be on file there.

Persons with old ledgers, record books, tax records, school records, church and Grange

records, are urged to bring them in for storage and safe keeping.

Library hours will be established and a microfilm reader will soon be available for patrons to read old newspapers and other records available on microfilm.

The room is in need of shelving, tables, chairs and other furnishings and the Society

is looking for donations.

"Genealogy and Photography" will be the subject of the May 4 meeting of the Genealogy meeting at Maple Rapids at 7:30 p.m. at the Village Community Room. Come learn about preserving and identifying your own photo treasures and discover what to look for in your genealogical search. A display of photos from "old" Maple Rapids will be part of the program.

In June the Genealogists will offer a program at St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Riley Township on "Church and Cemetery Records." The program starts with a potluck at 6 p.m. Bring a dish to pass, dinnerware and table services will be furnished. A fieldtrip will follow to nearby Boughton Cemetery for demonstrations on "tombstone rubbing."
