### Good Bye Hila, We'll Miss You

HTLA MABLE AXTELL BROSS, a former Clinton County Historical Society president and one of those instrumental in forming CCHS, died Dec. 15 at Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns. Mrs. Bross had been ill for the past year and until just a few weeks before her death had been staying with her son, Dan, and his family, at Traverse City.

Often alert in the weeks before her death, she was surrounded by

relatives and friends, many of them CCHS members.

Hila and her late husband, Manning, were well known in Mid Michigan musical, social and historical circles. They owned the historic old "Sait Box House" on U. S. 27 about four miles north of St. Johns and from 1953-64 they operated a restaurant there by that name. For the year preceding her death Hila shared her home with the CCHS Genealogy Division which operated our archives there.

"She's going down with all flags flying," Adele Jones, a relative and CCHS member, said just shortly before Hila died. That was an understatement as Hila kept family and friends busy in those last few weeks, passing along ideas for projects she felt various groups might undertake and inquiring about projects already in progress.

Hila retired as librarian from the Bement Library in St. Johns in 1976 and then, when a reporter asked a friend to describe Hila, she said, "Oh, she was into everything." Another understatement.

After hearing that Hila had cancer the St. Johns City Commission made her an honorary citizen of that city because she had always lived in nearby Greenbush Township but had been extremely active and supportive of all city projects and events.

Hila was a member of the Clinton County Bicentennial Committee & also of the 1980 Book Committee which spent five years researching and writing the history book CCHS published two years ago.

She and Manning were blessed with musical talents that they shared with the community and as an organist Hila's willingness to play for events knew no ethnic or religious barriers. She left a musical legacy, having taught piano in St. Johns and Ovid for many years.

Hila, 71, was buried in the family plat in St. Johns.



### Pot pourri

(Excerpts from old St. Johns municipal records of action of the town's village council) 1876 - No person except conservators of the peace shall carry concealed weapons....gave the village fire warden authority to inspect chimneys, condi tion of wood stoves & pipes and disposition of ashes and power to make owners remove "fire exposures." ... prohibited trains from blocking streets for more than 10 minutes at a time...mandated that no privies or cesspools be erected so leakage drained on surrounding land. Prohibited placing impure or unwholesome substances in public drinking troughs in 1980. In 1894 they had constructed a san itary sewer and an ordinance prohibited the running of storm water into it. (EDITOR'S NOTE: Sounds familiar,)

VALENTINES ...

(Information for this story is excerpted from The Howland Quarterly of July, 1969 and we thank Janet Snyder for making it available.)

...St. Valentine lived in Italy in the third century, it took a Worcester, Mass. girl who had recently graduated from the Mt. Holyoke Female Seminary in 1847 to really start the commercial manufacture of valentines in this country.

Esther Howland..., daughter of Southworth Allen Howland & Esther Allen. Her father....became the leading stationer & bookseller in Worcester. Soon after Esther graduated ... she received a valentine from England with white paper lace and cutout figures which she found so fascinating that she persuaded her father to import some of the supplies. She tried her hand at making the valentines and the next time her brother, Charles started out on his selling tour he took along some samples. Much to the family's delight he came home with orders for \$5,000 worth of Esther's new valentines.

... Ester was overwhelmed with the many unexpected orders but she gathered some young women together and the attic of her home was converted into a workroom. The young ladies worked on an assembly line basis, with Esther designing the cards and the young girls cutting out the backgrounds, the pictures and pasting the lace paper in place.

As years went along, they added Christmas and New Years cards and finally she was doing a \$100,000 yearly business.

Howland valentines can be identified by a red H stamped or pasted on the back, or the initials "N.E.V.Co." for New England Valentine Co.

These lentines were made between 1848 and 1880-81, when Esther soud the business to the George C. Whitney Co.

volunteer staff there. Anyone interested in helping should call Coletta at 224-4577 or Caudy at 224-2778.



UNCLE SAM TABOOS THE WORD POST MISTRESS AND CALLS HIS LADY MANAGERS OF LOCAL OFF-ICES "POSTMASTERS" AS IF THEY WERE INDEED MASTERS OF THE SITUATION. MISS AGNES SAGE, WHO WAS APPOINTED TO THE FOWLER OFFICE SOON AFTER THE DEATH OF HER FATHER, W. H. SAGE IN DECEMBER LAST YEAR, HAS BEEN IN ACTIVE CHARGE SINCE. SHE IS ABLY ASSISTED BY E. S. KNOWLAND, WHO WAS APPOINTED DEPUTY LAST FEBRUARY. MR KNOWLAND WAS BORN IN FOWLER, AND ALTHOUGH HE HAS SPENT A PORTION OF HIS TIME AWAY FROM THE VILLAGE, HE KNOWS EVERY PATRON OF THE OFFICE. FOR SEVERAL YEARS MR. KNOWLAND WAS A TELEGRAPH OPERATOR WITH THE GRAND TRUNK HAVING BEEN IN SEVERAL IMPORTANT STATIONS ON THE MAIN LINE. THE FOWLER OFFICE IS NICELY EQUIPED, THE FURNITURE HAVING BEEN REPLACED DURING THE CLEVELAND ADMINISTRATION. RURAL SERVICE IS GIVEN OUT OF THE VILLAGE BY ONE ROUTE AT THE PRESENT TIME. H. B. THORNTON IS THE CARRIER AND HAS 130 BOXES ON HIS LINE, WHICH RUNS NORTH OF THE VILLAGE. THIS ROUTE WAS ESTABLISHED IN APRIL 1900 AND A DAY DELIVERY HAS NEVER BEEN MISSED SINCE. MISS SAGE IS NOT ONLY OBLIGING TO A FAULT BUT KIND & CONSIDERATE AND THE PATRONS OF THE FOWLER OFFICE ALL SPEAK IN THE HIGHEST TERMS OF HER ADMINISTRATION OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE OFFICE.
