NEW MAPLE RIVER PROJECT

Duck houses, dykes, marsh land expansion & an osprey platform are included in a 230-acre project at the Maple River State Game Area on US 27 between St. Johns and Ithaca.

The river played an important role in the settling and early life in Clinton and surround-

ing counties.

The project is sponsored by the newly formed Michigan Wildlife Habit Foundation which is now raising the \$30,000 cost by selling 480 prints of a painting by Andy Kurzmann, a Battle Creek artist, depicting a Heron in the Maple River marsh. The first 230 will be autographed by former Gov. William Milliken and ex-State Rep. Thomas Anderson.

Dubbed the Milli-Ander Project, it's name honors the two men considered important wild-

life conservationists in Michigan.

The 230 prints will be sold only through the foundation and will be considered "shares" in the project. Buyers will receive shareholder certificates and lapel pins of the Heron.

Cost is \$130 and the autographed 230 prints are expected to be collector items. They can be purchased only from the Foundation at 2325 S. Cedar, Lansing, Mi. 48910. The remaining 250 unautographed copies will be sold in area art galleries.

Dennis Fijalkowski, foundation executive director, said people not wanting to purchase a print but who want to support the project can g d donations to the above address.

Long ago much of the twisting Maple River and its bordering lowlands were a natural marsh and home for waterfowl, songbirds and fur bearing animals. The Saginaw Trail, an Indian path-

way, wound through the game area.

White settlers arrived in the early 1800's. Among them was George Campau who called the river the Riviere du Plain. In 1826 George Campau, a French fur trader, paddled up the river and erected a trading post at Maple Rapids with permission from Chief Makitoquet & the Chippewa tribe. While other traders had passed through Clinton previously, Campau was the first white man to live in Clinton.







TOMMY HATLEY DID IT .- YESTERDAY MORNING TOMMY HATLEY, NIGHT WATCH-MAN IN THE ST. JOHNS MANUFACTURING COMPANY'S WORKS, TOOK AN INCORRECT PEEP AT THE CLOCK AND BLEW THE WHISTLE AT FIFTEEN MINUTES TO SIX IN-STEAD OF SEVEN, AS HE SUPPOSED, WHICH CAUSED A GOODLY NUMBER OF OUR PEOPLE TO "ROLL OUT" WITH NO LITTLE RELUCTANCE. SOME SUPPOSED IT WAS AN ALARM OF FIRE, WHILE OTHERS THOUGHT IT WAS TIME TO GO TO WORK. SOMEONE, THINKING HE SMELLED A TERRIBLE CONFLAGRATION NOT FAR AWAY, RUSHED TO THE FIRE-ENGINE HOUSE AND ATTEMPTED TO SOUND THE ALARM, BUT HE WAS UNABLE TO PRODUCE ANYTHING ABOVE A DEATH-KNELL, AND THIS AGAIN CAUSED THE BEFOGGED PEOPLE, SOME OF WHOM WERE RUNNING HITHER AND THITHER ALMOST OUT OF BREATH, WITH EYES STRETCHED OPEN AND EARS PRICK-ED FORWARD AS IF THEY EXPECTED TO STEP INTO THE FIRE EVERY MOMENT, TO ASK: "WHERE--WHERE--WHE-WHE'S THE FIRE?" THEN THOSE WHO HAD UNTANGLED THE MYSTERY WOULD SAY: "O, TOMMY HATLEY ONLY HAD ONE EYE OPEN WHEN HE GAZED AT THE CLOCK." THOMAS WILL HAVE BOTH EYES ON IT HEREAFTER ...
