# Dr. Caesar does it again

Clinton County's best known and possibly most industrious historian has done it again.

Dr. Ford Caesar, author of many local histories, has just completed what may be his most ambitious project. Ten years of research and two years of writing have produced "The Great Northern Ghost"-The Story of the Lansing to St. Johns electric trolley.

The electric railroad traveled from Lans-Ing, through DeWitt and ended up in St. Johns between the early 1900s and 1929.

Caesar is the logical person to write the definitive history of this area's electric railroad, having ridden it as a young man.

"I had relatives up at French's Corners," he remembered. "I would ride the train to St. Johns and then walk out to their place."

Coming from Lansing you would turn west on Centerline and go to /County Farm Rd, turn north ½ mile to Yallup.

H. E. Walbridge--A St. Johns attorney who played an important role in negotiations between railroad and land owners.

Charles M. Merrill--Clinton County Probate Judge in the early 1900s.
