#### 4-H livestock goes to top bidders

ST. JOHNS - Spirited bidding between two supermarkets sent prices to record highs at the 4H Fair livestock auction.

Rande Hansen, 18, of Bath got \$4.30 per pound from Goff Food Stores for his 1,260-pound grand champion steer. Goff also bought the grand champion hog raised by Tim Kissane, 10, of St. Johns, paying \$4.80 per pound for the 245-pound porker.

Kroger purchased the grand champion lamb raised by Marc Martin, 13, of St. Johns. The store paid \$10.50 per pound for the 135-pound animal.

Kroger also bought the reserve grand champio steer, owned by Bill Ritchie, 19, of Bath, 11 weighes

1,185 pounds and sold for \$1.30 per pound.

Clinton Bank 120th birthday



1865 - Lincoln was assassinated; the Civil War ended; and in Clinton County the First National Bank of St. Johns, now known as Clinton Bank and Trust, opened. The bank recently celebrated its 120th birthday and visitors munched refreshments and viewed a newly remodeled lobby. When founded, the bank had \$50,000 in capital; it now exceeds \$9 million. Through the years it merged with banks in Elsie, Fowler and Laingsburg and now has 13 branch offices and its main headquarters on N. Clinton Avenue in St. Johns. It is one of Clinton's largest employers, with 120 employees.

May 31st/95 St. Johns Table Factory burned; estimated loss \$100,000.

Painted house June 96/ Body 12 ga trimming 6 gal. William J. Bryan in St. Johns Oct 17 - 96.

Went to Lansing to hear Bob Ingersol, Nov. 23. Rained Thanksgiving. Went to DeWitt to play at night Nov. 23. Dec. 14 trade horses with Bert Cook,

feathery snow but no sleighing to Jan. 1, 1989, played nine years at Bengal Hall.

July 9, 98 frost that killed corn and many things. Played for 9 dances in Aug, 1898. Played for 20 dances from Thanksgiving to middle

of Apr. 99. 1902 the wettest season for years, to July 3rd, at night the heaviest rain of the season.

Lime Schank died Feb. 9, 08. Sister M. C. Fox died Jan 12th, 08.

The shrinkage of values in the U. S. A. alone since the Demonatization of Silver in 1873 is estimated by Senator Chandler to be 16 billions of dollars or 5 times the cost of the Civil War. First tree cut in St Johns in May 1854.

### WE WANT TO SHARE OURS!

(Editor's Note: We will pass along here notes from the various CCHS departments. Because of space, we regret that editing is necessary but we will try not to leave out anything that is important or change meaning. Thank you for your cooperation.)

A letter to CCHS members and Friends of PGS (from the Rumbaughs)

The museum has never budgeted for purchases of artifacts. We found ourselves in a position, last July, where we felt it important to retain some items in Clinton County and it could be done only by purchasing them. At a pre-public estate sale of Guy Frace we purchased two large oil paintings and a tomahawk.

A few weeks later the Parish family of the Episcopal Church, St. Johns, heirs to the estate, gave a portrait of Joseph Campau, a statuette of Joseph, and many other items relating to the Campau family, the first white settler in Clinton County. It is with extreme gratitude we thank the Parish family for these gifts.

The 44½ x 51½ (frame included) painting is an 1879 portrait of Madame Alexander Campau, wife of Joseph Campau's youngest son, Alexander T. With her is their daughter, Milcah, b. 1877 Detroit, d. 2/26/49 St. Johns, the wife of a local doctor, Dr. Guy Henry Frace; and mother of Guy Henry Frace, whose estate was for sale. The small er painting, 30½ x 35½ is a portrait of Dr. Frace's father, Henry Frace. He was in the mercantile business in Saranac. Restoration will be needed on both paintings.

The tomahawk is an old one and we'd like to believe it was an item George Campau was trading with the Indians at Campau Trading Post near what was to become Maple Rapids. It has been used and there are several notches on the handle.

The cost is \$410 for the items and, with restoration we estimate it will be \$1,200 - \$1,500. We have created a fund in the museum and hope our museum friends and CCHS members will make donations. Send checks to PGS Museum/ c/o Clinton County Historical Society, Box 174, St. Johns, Mi. 48879.

Feb. 12, 1894, worst blizzard in years hit this state, Jan. & Feb.

Michigan Mortgage Co. failed, limited to \$100,000 liabilities.
