We had been to West Germany and flown out of Luxembourg. The flight was somewhat delayed by a near accident at John F. Kennedy International Airport; hence, our bus had gone and we were stranded.

Mrs. Ceasar, two businessmen and myself engaged a taxi, which cost us about \$32 to get to our motel-hotel in Newark. Prior to our entering the Holland tunnel one of the occupants raised the question as to our ever seeing the National Monument. We looked out of the window and there in a great halo of light - holding her torch aloft - was a most awesome spectacle.

I think now that I have seen the Statue of Liberty I have a greater appreciation of our forefathers and the immigrants who came through the port of New York City and gazed with admiration at that giant symbol of freedom.

The Living Museum

Who Came To Clinton County . . .



CHARLES ERNST BEARNDT

Charles Ernst Bearndt was born Feb. 9, 1833 in Mecklenbury, Schwerin, Germany. The son of Lewis F. & Badalena Bearndt. He married Miss. Fredericka Johanna Doretta Ellett of the same place in Germany, Oct. 28, 1859. To this union eleven children were born...Charles, Jr., Theodore, Anna, Lewis, Edmond, Minnie, Frederick, Henry, William C., and May. Six were born in Germany. Theodore & Edmond died in infancy in Germany. The family left Germany Oct. 15, 1865, in a sailing ship. They were on the ocean nearly a week when they had to return back, as the boat had sprung a leak. They then sailed a second time and incountered a very rough voyage. Frederick the youngest was taken sick and died and was buried at sea, at the age of 3 months. After a long voyage they landed in New York, 23rd of January 1866, being 14 weeks on the ocean.

They first settled near Napoleon, MI, later moving to Grass Lake in Jackson Co., MI, where they lived several years. There daughter, Minnie, died at age 6 years. Sometime after 1871 they came to Clinton Co. One son Lewis died 17 April 1906. Mrs. Bearndt passed away Aug. 20, 1907. After his wifes death Mr. Bearndt went to live with his son William (Carl) N.W. of St. Johns, where he remained for 11 years before passing away 26 July 1921. He lived to be 88 years 5mos and 17 days of age. Mr. & Mrs. Bearndt were members of the Lutheran Church of Fowler for many years. At the time of his death five children were living. Charles Jr. of St. Johns (who had the tin shop on N. Clinton Ave.) Anna Seifert and Henry of Bengal Twp., Wm. C. near St. Johns, and May Felton of Crystal MI.

The family plot can be found in the Oak Ridge Cemetery also a daughter Etta D. who died May 11, 1896 at age 11 years 7 mos and 19 days...also Charley M. Bearndt born Feb. 11, 1858 and died Sept. 24, 1929.

The William C. Bearndt farm is still occupied by his widow on N. Dewitt Rd. at the present time.


