Edited from the court transcript

Judge Martlew: This is the last session of the Clinton County Circuit Court to be held in this building. This court held its first session in this courtroom in approximately October 1871. At that time the United States was still a young republic, less than 100 years old. The nation's attempt at selfdisintegration had ended with the conclusion of the Civil War just six years earlier. Ulysses S. Grant was president of the United States. Robert E. Lee had just died without ever receiving a pardon for his participation in the southern rebellion. George Armstrong Custer command of the Seventh Cavalry in the Oklahoma territory, and another five years would pass before he would die at Little Big Horn. The telephone, automobile, and the airplane had not been invented; however, one could travel from here to California in about a week's time on the three-year-old transcontinental railroad.

On the world scene, Great Britain was the undisputed military and economic super power of the world. Queen Victoria sat on her throne. Her navy ruled the waves, and the English proudly proclaimed that, "The sun never sets on the British Empire." Winston Churchill had not been born; nor had Adolf Hitler, Benito Musselini, Joseph Stalin, Franklin D. Roosevelt, or Dwight D. Eisenhower. France was ruled by Emperor Napoleon III, and Otto VonBismarck was chancellor of Prussia, pursuing his aim at a unified German state under the Prussian Kaiser Wilhelm the First.

Clinton County was strictly an agrarian culture, as was most of the United States. The only towns of any

size here were St. Johns and the villages of DeWitt and Ovid. Their business communities were entirely tied to the local farming economy.

One could travel from here to the state's capitol in Lansing on horseback in approximately a day; although, around the turn of the century, 30 years hence, inter-urban railways made that same round trip twice a day.

The world that saw the construction of this courthouse no longer exists, and those who built it could never begin to imagine the world we live in today. However, this structure has served its purpose well for nearly 127 years.

The family were members of the Lowe Methodist Church.

SANDER PLINY PINO

My grandfather, Sander Pliny Pino, came to Essex Twp. in Clinton Co. from Kent Co. in 1854. He married Julia Anna West in 1878, and they lived in a log cabin about a mile from the Lowe School and Church. To this marriage were born seven boys and one girl: Ivan, Floyd, J. Arthur, Ralph, Edna, Otto, Austin, and Vernon.

I remember my father, J. Arthur, telling us that the older ones slept in the loft and that they had to shake the snow from the bed covers before they arose. But it was a wonderful life, according to

all accounts. They lived just across the fields from their Uncle Herman and Aunt Mary Ward who lived on Colony Road, There were many other relatives and friends living not too far away, some of whom have been written about in The History of Clinton Co., Michigan, published in 1980.

They moved to a larger and much nicer farm in 1898 in Gratiot Co. Perhaps the hardships which they endured in their earlier years imbued them with the fortitude and character needed to withstand the heartaches which were to follow. Floyd contracted typhoid fever and died. My father was also stricken with the disease and had to have a leg amputated just below the knee. This tragedy, however, may have transformed the lives of his younger siblings. He had always planned on being a farmer, but he had to face the fact that this would now be impractical for him. He enrolled in Ferris Institute and lived in the loft of a barn, taking care of horses in order to work his way through. Upon leaving, he became a life insurance agent for the Mutual Benefit Life Ins. Co. in Big Rapids and then on to Owosso. It was here that he met his future wife in the Methodist Church where they were both actively involved. Within a year's time he moved to Lansing to become district manager.

He inspired all of his younger brothers and one sister to further their education as much as possible, which they all successfully did. They became teachers, a doctor, a horticulturist, and an engineer. They all helped one another to obtain these goals.

My father travelled by horse and buggy during his early years as an insurance agent over much of his old stamping grounds, often staying at the **Frank Anderson** farm or with **Jim Campbell.** It was not unusual for him to fill in as preacher, Sunday School teacher or leader of the Epworth League if he

were called upon to do so as he travelled about.

J. Arthur Pino and Addie E. Smith, a teacher, musician, poet, and scholar, were married in 1911 and had six children: Ralph, Dorothy Sheap, James Robert, Harriet King, and Edward.

My husband, Stanley Sheap, and I have lived on Turner Road. in Clinton Co. for 48 years, only three miles away from where I grew up on Delta River Road. We have three children:

Catherine, Robert, and Rebecca, and three grandchildren, none of whom live in Clinton Co.

THREE SCORE & TEN

A series of items appeared in various issues of *The Clinton Republican* from Jan. 21 to Mar. 14, 1901. The newspaper's readers sent in names of "old settlers" of whom they had knowledge. The articles which follow have been edited, but still contain all names mentioned in the originals.

Jan. 31, 1901

H.B. Bliss of St. Johns, one of the old settlers here, says he would like to know how many people there are in the county over 70 years old. *The Republican* will publish the names and location if they are sent in

Feb. 7, 1901

We have several octogenarians living in or near Elsie. We have three ladies whose combined ages will reach the very respectable figures of 260, lacking a few months. Mrs. Butts, who will be 87 in April; Mrs. Elizabeth Hill, whose birthday occurs next August, and Mrs. C.L. Chase, whose 86th birthday is this week Thursday. (Elsie)

J.B. Randolph of Westphalia says, "Tell Mr. Bliss that I am not over 70, but was born in the territory of Michigan in 1831, so if he can beat that he is an old Michigander."

Feb. 14, 1901

My name is **John C. Brunson**, was born July 20, 1822, in East Bloomfield, Ontario Co., NY, and came to Victor, MI, Oct. 23, 1845. Mar. 5, 1846, I bought the land I now live on and it has been my home ever since. I am now 78y, 6m, and 13d old. My farm consists of 153 ½ acres with no mortgage or other debts which is my life's monument.

Joseph Terry lives on section 19 of Victor. He was born in Tompkins Co., NY, on May 7, 1829.

Feb. 18, 1901

Joseph Scott, St. Johns, father of Mrs. C.E. Knapp, is 84 and works at the cooper trade every day.

I was born Sept. 10, 1815, in NY state, Yates Co., town of Starkey, moved in Michigan in 1837, one of the old settlers. Mrs. C.L. Millard, Fowler.

Mrs. Eliza A. Weeks is 79. She was born in Cambridge, MA, and came to Michigan in 1849 and has resided in Lebanon ever since. Ralph Hoge.

Mrs. Margaret Rose of Bath was born in Steuben Co., NY, Dec. 17, 1802, came to Michigan in 1836, and to Clinton Co. Apr. 12, 1838, and settled on the farm where she still lives with her son, William H. Rose. She is in good bodily health and intends to pass the century mark on this side of Jordan. When she came to Bath, DeWitt and Bath townships were one.

Feb. 21, 1901

E.W. Cobb was 71 years old last June. His wife, Anne (Sickels) Cobb, was born May 19, 1831, so is not quite 70 yet. They have lived on one farm 45 years, and both have lived in the state since they were children. Mrs. E.W. Cobb, Elsie.

My father Sylvester Carter, lives in Duplain, was born in Chesire Co., NH, in Sept. 4, 1815. I think he came to Clinton Co. in 1837 and settled in Duplain, where he has since resided. Mrs. Sarah Kelly, Durand.

Day Payne says he was born Dec., 1831, in the territory of Michigan and has never Feb. 21, 1901 been out of the state. W.E. Warner.

March 14, 1901

Seeing the notice for the aged of Clinton Co., I send my name, Joshua Rapalee, as one of the pioneers. I was born in Yates Co., NY, July 12, 1820. I came to this farm when the country was a wilderness with only an Indian trail to guide me. I found a little log hut for a home 45 years ago. Another of the friends who came from dear old Yates Co. is Mrs. Mary Winfield of Shepardsville, who will be 84 if she lives until the second day of Apr. She is still able to build her fires, see to her chickens, and with some help do her own cooking and keep her home. (Jessie area)

I send you the name of an old pioneer, Mrs. Sarah Parker of Victor.
Mrs. Parker will be 86 years old the 19th of this month. She came from NY state to Victor in 1836, and she has always lived on the same farm. Her husband died the 4th of July 1863. She has eight children living and five that have crossed the river with their father. J.W.
Montague (Price)

Mrs. Sarah Norris was born in Essex Co., NY, in 1817, came to Wayne Co., MI, in 1837. She came to Clinton Co. in 1839, where she has since resided, and is nearly 84 years old. (St. Johns)

I am 74 years of age and have lived in Clinton Co. 35 years. Sarah A. Floate, (Maple Rapids)

EASY ON THAT BOOK!
