#### **FAMILY HISTORIES**

Featured here are family histories which were submitted ca 1993 for a proposed supplement to the 1980 Clinton County History book. (See *Clinton Co. Trails*, Vol. 12, #1.) Shirley E. (Mrazek) VanVleet wrote the histories in this issue.

## GARY and SHIRLEY VAN VLEET

Gary Allan VanVleet married Shirley Ellen Mrazek, daughter of Louis and Edna Mrazek of Rochester Colony (Greenbush Twp.) on 20 June 1953. They were both graduates of Rodney B. Wilson High School. Shirley was the homecoming queen of the class of 1953.

They resided in Virginia Beach, VA, from June 1953 through May 1956 while Gary served in the US Navy at Oceana, VA. He was a photographer in an air squadron attached to an aircraft carrier. After his honorable discharge in May 1956, they returned to St. Johns, MI, and built a home on a portion of the family farm on Price Road, Olive Twp. where they lived for over 30 years.

Gary and Shirley had two sons:

Gary Stephen "Steve," born May 9,
1956, at Virginia Beach, Norfolk, VA,
and Jeffrey Allan "Jeff," born at St.
Johns, Aug. 8, 1960. They attended the
one-room Merrihew School on Price
Road, the fourth generation of VanVleets
to do so. Both boys were very active in 4H in many project areas and each
achieved the Outstanding 4-H Boy award
in their last year as members. Steve and
Jeff are both graduates of the St. Johns
High School. Steve attended MSU and
Jeff attended LCC.

Steve lives in the DeWitt area and is employed at the Lansing Federal Automakers Credit Union.

Jeff lives in the St. Johns area and is employed at E.T.M in Grand Ledge. He is married to **Debra Williams**. They have three sons: **Mike**, **Eric**, and **Andy**.

Gary and Shirley moved to Higgins Lake, MI, in 1991 after his retirement from the US Postal Service and where he served 34 years as a letter carrier. She retired from the St. Johns Public Schools. They enjoy their family and travel.

#### ROBERT AND ARLEITA VAN VLEET

Robert Francis VanVleet was born on Apr. 3, 1913, to Fred and Maude (Vredenburg) VanVleet. He was a well-known Olive Twp. farmer.

Robert married Arleita Belle
Armstrong on June 27, 1932, in St.
Johns, MI. They had six children: Gary
Allan, Bruce Robert, Marlene Alice,
Ronald Frederick, Janet Kay, and
David Rex, all born in Olive Twp. David
passed away in June 1943, age 6 months.

In 1958 Robert and Arleita moved to Higgins Lake, MI, and in 1972 they moved to the upper peninsula of Michigan. They spent their summers there and winters in Arizona.

Robert died July 8, 1990, in Marquette, MI, age 77. He is buried in the South Bingham Cemetery.

Arleita returned to her home town of St. Johns in 1992 to be near her family and to renew old friendships. In August 1992 a family reunion was held at Arleita's new home with all of her children and their families attending. She spends her winters in Arizona where she enjoys the sunshine and old friends. She also enjoys the company of her special pal, her dog Boomer.

## FREDERICK AND MAUDE VAN VLEET

Frederick Clarence VanVleet was a highly respected, well-known Olive Twp. farmer, having lived there all of his life. He was born Nov. 13, 1872, son of Philo and Antoinette VanVleet.

Fred married Maude Edna
Vredenburg Nov. 20, 1895. They had
five children: Gladys Antoinette, Mable
Leola, Hazel Irene, Marian Alene, and
Robert Francis, all born in Olive Twp.,
Clinton Co. Fred was a member of the
Masonic Lodge and was involved in Farm
Bureau affairs for many years. He died
March 2, 1950, in Olive Twp.

Maude Edna, a life-long resident of Clinton Co., was born to Francis and Nellie (Rockwell) Vredenburg Oct. 8, 1876. She was a member of the Olive Methodist Church and the Radiant Chapter O.E.S. of St. Johns. She died Apr. 24, 1955.

Fred and Maude are buried in the South Bingham Cemetery.

#### PHILO VAN VLEET

Philo VanVleet descended from Aurie VanVleet/Vliet/Fleet, one of the first VanVleets to come from Holland about 1665. They came first to New Jersey, then to New York. Some of the family fought in the Revolutionary War.

Philo was born at Arkwright, Chautauqua Co., NY, June 29, 1822. At age 14 he moved with his parents from his birthplace to Hillsdale Co., MI. They traveled in a wagon drawn by oxen.

Philo remained at home for a few years before moving to St. Joseph Co. to do farm work. There he met **Elenor McDonald** and they were married Oct. 14, 1847. In 1854 they moved to Bingham Twp. Elenor died Feb. 26, 1864, in Clinton Co.

Philo then married Sally
Antoinette (Taber) Peck Nov. 9, 1864.

In Nov. 1866 they moved to a farm in section 9, Olive Twp.

Philo VanVleet was always referred to as an honest, sober, industrious, man, kind and indulgent in his family and obliging and kind as a neighbor. He was always found on the right side of all questions of public interest and was never afraid to give his opinion when asked to do so. When the news of Philo's death on Aug. 24, 1897, in his 76<sup>th</sup> year was received, these words were uttered on every side: "A good and valuable man has died." A good name is a lasting monument.

Sally died Feb. 4, 1908. She and Philo are buried in the South Bingham Cemetery.

Philo's children had three with his first wife: Francis, Jeanette, and Martin; and four with his second wife: Adelbert, Frederick, Willie, and Lee

#### ALBERT VREDENBURG

Albert Hamilton Vredenburg was born Sept. 9, 1812, in NY state. He died June 14, 1882, in Ottawa Co., MI.

Albert and his family moved to St. Johns, MI, in 1860. In 1861 they moved to Olive Twp. and built a home just south of the junction of County Farm and Price Roads. In the fall of 1862 Albert went to serve in the Civil War and was stationed at Washington, D.C. He served until the war ended and was honorably discharged.

Albert had thirteen children, the 11<sup>th</sup> being Francis Marian. He married Nellie Rockwell, a descendant of Charles Rockwell. Francis and Nellie lived on a farm on DeWitt Road and they had two daughters: Maude Edna who married Frederick VanVleet and Emily.

## FLOYD AND MINNIE ARMSTRONG

Floyd Armstrong was born in Duplain Twp., Clinton Co., on June 30, 1881. He was a farmer all his life. His parents were Francis and Salina (Bartel) Armstrong. He married Minnie Alice Carroll in Oct 1912. They had one child, Arleita Belle, born Dec. 12, 1913. She married Robert F. VanVleet.

Minnie, a resident of Clinton Co. all her life was born in Duplain Feb. 18, 1889, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Carroll. She died, age 45, at 6:30 p.m., Nov. 21, 1934, at Clinton Memorial Hospital after a four-week illness.

Floyd died at Pleasant View Hospital in Corunna, MI, age 79. He and Minnie are buried in South Bingham Cemetery.

### LOUIS AND EDNA MRAZEK

Louis Mrazek and Edna Wilson were married May 30, 1935, in Owosso, MI. They were residents of the Rochester Colony, Greenbush Twp., Clinton Co. for 36 years. They had five children: Shirley Ellen who married Gary VanVleet, Louis James, Joyce Ann Barnes, Donna Jean O'Brien and Virginia Kay.

Louis lives at the Rochester Colony home where he enjoys his family and reading. Edna died unexpectedly on Feb. 12, 1979, aged 59. She is buried in the Duplain Cemetery.

### **GEORGE THOMAS**

The following is excepted from an article about the Civil War in the May/June issue of *Michigan History Magazine*, on page 13:

"In Campbell Hospital, the one I visited today, the wounds are comparatively slight... Geo. Thomas, St. Johns, Co. 1, 27<sup>th</sup> Inf., flesh wound through the right cheek, not bad... Among the hundreds of these scarred and battered veterans I talked with, I heard but one murmur or complaint, and

that was from the lips of the sturdy fellow from St. Johns above named, who said he 'didn't think it was half fair to be popped over in the way he was without having a chance to shoot once! He was just getting into position when that ugly bit of lead came along and spoilt his face and his chance of returning the compliment.'"

#### EARLY EAGLE

The Clinton Republican, 17 Mar 1921 (page 13, col. 4) from the Portland Review

Mrs. Walter Buckley of Eagle, who descended from one of the first families to settle in that part of the state, furnishes the *Review* with the following interesting account of pioneer days:

In the year 1834 there were five families in what is now the town of Eagle; namely, Stephen B. Groger, Heman Thomas, David Clark, Mr. Benson, and John Shear. They took up government land and lived within a mile of each other. There was no road to guide them in their undertaking.

They built themselves cabins out of logs, there being no sawmills. They split out what they called "shakes" for roofing. There was no glass for the windows, so they tacked white cloth over the openings and for doors they hung blankets. At night it was necessary to keep a fire going in front of the houses to keep away the wolves and other wild animals which were numerous.

The nearest place where necessary commodities could be bought was a trading post at DeWitt and one at Portland where these early settlers exchanged their produce for furs. They reached these points on a raft, going to DeWitt on the Lookingglass and to Portland on the Grand River.

Stephen Groger worked for a man named Scott at DeWitt and would carry his flour and groceries home Saturday night on his back, walking both ways. Later on he helped newcomers locate farms, often carrying a bag of specie on their backs, there being no paper money in those days, and tramping all day to find a desirable location. He located land all through Clinton, Eaton, and Ionia Counties for several years.

These newcomers cleared their land and raised what they could to eat, and as there were marshy places, they cut hay from these for their stock—those who were lucky enough to have any. There was any amount of cranberries and they made maple sugar which they would take to the trading posts and trade for supplies.

It was in November 1834 that the first white child in Clinton Co. was born to Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Groger—a girl, and she was named Susan.

The many hardships these pioneers had to endure are hard to realize in these days of automobiles and modern improvements. I do not know how long it was before a school was organized, but think it must have been some time for my mother, Fannie Groger, went back to the state of New York to attend school and lived at the home of her mother's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Abijah Joslin, grandparents of Emery Joslin, who lives near Lyons.




Ancestors of Jeffery O Krumm

Hourglass Tree of Jeffery Owen Krumm




## BLUE WATER HIGHWAY?

CCHS officers know.




## P-G-S FUND DRIVE
