

### Way Back To School

A look at the history of Michigan schools provided by the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission of Lansing, Michigan in April 1963.

1705 - Marquette unsuccessfully attempted to establish a seminary for French and Indian children at Fort Pontchratrian in Detroit.

1760 - First private schools for English families appeared. Supported by the parents of the attending pupils, these schools were usually held in a single room where the teacher lived.

1787 - The first hint of a statewide school system was set forth by provision of the ordinance of the Northwest Territory, which states that "schools and means of education shall be forever encouraged."

**1809** - The establishment of public free schools on a statewide basis by Act of the Northwest Territory.

1817 - A territorial law provided for the establishment of the University of Michigan. Its main objective-development of a system of primary schools to teach writing, arithmetic, English grammar, and elocution. The districts were random and overlapping. The University was to furnish any secondary training. There efforts were generally unsuccessful.

1826 - Lewis Cass, governor of Michigan Territory, declared that a republican form of government can be maintained only by the Virtue and intelligence of the citizens, and that the diffusion of education among the people will result in an appreciation of the value of governmental institutions.

**1827** - Territorial legislature passed a law creating an ambitious and complex school system. It was not put into effect, however, because of administrative and financial problems.

1835 - The proposed state constitution required that the legislature shall provide a system of schools that shall be maintained and operated in each school district for a minimum of three months in each year. The Constitution was voted upon and passed in October.

1836 - John D. Pierce was appointed first Superintendent by territory government. Pierce then drafted plans for the organization of primary schools and a state university. One objective was to provide every child in the state with an elementary education.

1837 - Michigan was admitted to the Union by Act of the U.S. Congress. One section in each township was to provide sites to be used for educational purposes. Where this section had been sold or disposed of, the township was required to supply the equivalent of those lands for the same purpose. The proceeds from the sale of such tracts supplied the "primary interest fund" from which a system to finance schools perpetually was established.

1842- State authority given to City of Detroit to combine two or more districts and gathering all of the children to be taught under roof. The "union" school then was a large, graded facility which was the predecessor to the present high school. Free

public education was provided for all children between 5 and 17 years of age residing in such districts. This law made a city or town the unit for the local administration of the schools.

1871 - The first Kindergarten was established in Michigan by Public Act 119, although it was not added tot he public system until 1891.

1874 - In a national test case, the Michigan Supreme Court upheld a decision by a Chancery


Court confirming the legality of raising taxes to provide free high school education. The case has been referred to as the "Kalamazoo Case" as it occurred in Kalamazoo Township, Michigan.

1914 - First public junior college was opened in Grand Rapids.

1938 - Teachers certificates required four years completion of a satisfactory college course, plus successfully teaching three years during the first five years after graduation form college.



Ida Lyon (1865-1937) was born on a farm in Washtenaw County, now lying under the intersection of I-94 and M-14, just west of Ann Arbor. In a few months she moved with her parents to a farm in Bengal Township, and later to St. Johns. She married a graduate of the SJHS class of 1880, John Hoxley Fildew, in St. Johns in 1891. They had two daughters and two sons, all born in St. Johns.

Ida was descended from two unrelated colonial New England families. Her maternal grandfather, Royal C. Lyon bought 300 acres of newly opened land in Bengal Township for \$750 in late 1852. The timing was propitious because in 1853 the Detroit and Milwaukee Railroad was surveyed through the township and land was acquired for a town and station at St. Johns. My ancestors continued to live in the County until World War I when they moved to southeast Michigan. (contributed by John Hoxley Fildew, II)

# Roy & Mamie (Melvin) Gibson Family by Jean Gibson

Joshua LeRoy Gibson, "Roy," at age 29, and Jemima Hall Melvin, "Mamie," at age 32, were married in March of 1922 in Jackson Co. and went to live in a two-story house on the southeastern corner (70 acres) of Airport and Chadwick Roads in Olive Twp., Clinton Co., purchasing the property from A.D. "Deb" Devereaux. Both buyer and owner later had a difficult time to keep the property during the depression.

Mamie, born July 12, 1890, the daughter of Alexander and Barbara (Hall) Melvin, had come with friends from Aberdeen, Scotland, to Toronto, Canada, leaving behind her parents and siblings. From there she went to Jackson, MI, where a brother-in-law John Knight and son Alex lived having previously come from Scotland. Later her sister Barbara came to join her husband John. Barbara and John later moved to Detroit where they raised their children Alex, John, Barry, and Eddy. This family often went to Mamie and Roy's farm to visit and spend the weekend.

Roy was born May 3, 1893, on Jackson Road, south of Breckenridge in Gratiot Co. to **George** and **Annie (Ladyman) Gibson.** Roy had a half-brother **Charles** from his father's first marriage. He also had an older brother **Ted** who died at age 16. Later Roy and his parents moved to Rives Junction in southern Michigan where his father had first lived after arriving here from England. Roy worked in a brick factory there. It was during this time that he met Mamie.

Charles had bought a farm and remained in Gratiot Co. He married **Maude Shaw** and to this union were born two children **Henry** and **Dorothy.** After the death of Roy's mother, his father married a third time.

Mamie and Roy spent all their years together at the same farm, raising various

crops and animals. They sold milk, hogs, and eggs. They had little recreation outside of visiting relatives and friends and going to town. Sometimes they attended the Farmers' Club, which was a neighborhood get-together, and they went to the Simmons School Christmas programs. Mamie received her citizenship papers on Dec. 7, 1942, of which she was very proud.

Their son Melvin Roy Gibson was born Sept. 12, 1924. While home he spent most of his time helping his dad with the farming. Any extra time was spent playing ball. After Melvin's graduation from St. Johns High School in 1943 he held various jobs as well as farming rented ground. On Dec. 19, 1948, he married Jean Ione Farrier at the DeWitt Community Church. Melvin and Jean lived on his recently purchased farm further west on Chadwick Road. He continued farming and later also drove school bus for the St. Johns Public Schools while Jean taught school for several years in many schools within the county; and also retired from the St. Johns Public Schools. They had five children: Paula Jean, Beckie Jo, Tod J., Ted M., and Lon R. All are now married with families of their own and living in the area.

In March of 1975 both Roy and Mamie went to live in a nursing home in St. Johns when Roy, after several small strokes, could no longer take care of things at home. Mamie died while there on Aug 6, 1975. Their first great grandchild **Jodie Renae Pettigrew** was born just a few weeks before her death. Roy died of pneumonia on June 28, 1981, after being moved to another nursing home located north of St. Johns. Both are buried near the front of the DeWitt Cemetery.

Now Roy and Mamie's grandson **Ted**, his wife **Barbara** (**Hodges**), and their three children **Andrea**, **Luke**, and **Elizabeth** live in that two-story house on the southeastern corner of Chadwick and Airport Roads.
