GUESTS ON PROWL WHEN SMOKE BLOWS IN HOTEL WINDOW

When there's smoke there's usually fire, but according to reports that wasn't the case at the Steel hotel in St. Johns Monday night. It seems that a guest set fire to a bed quilt with a cigaret [sic] and tossed the smoldering blanket out the window. It landed on an adjacent roof and the smoke blew back into the building.

Two other guests, sniffing said smoke, set out on an investigations tour and finally found the cause. There was no fire in the hotel and no damage was done except to the blanket.

OPENS NEW BARBER SHOP AT ELSIE

Clarence Cornwell, who has been connected with the Senate Barber Shop for a number of years, has opened a shop in the office of the late **Dr. Bell**. The office has just been remodeled and redecorated.

GRAND LEDGE

St. Johns News - Aug 28, 1890

- → The Grand ledge Mining Co. are engaged in erecting a hoisting derrick at their coal mine in Eagle, and with the necessary cages and cars expect to commence raising coal to the surface by steam next week. Mr. Crumb, the new manager is pushing the work as rapidly as possible. Railroad officials were expected here yesterday to arrange for putting in a side-track to the mine.
- → Eight barrels of beer were emptied in the creek at Westphalia the other day by direction of internal revenue agent, Otis Fuller.

WACOUSTA

St. Johns News - Dec 24, 1896

STORY OF A STUMP Tree Was Cut Sixty Years Ago and Made into a Canoe

Half a mile from Wacousta, on the banks of the Looking Glass River, stands the stump of a black walnut tree that was felled in 1837 or 1838 by Indians employed by the settlers and paid in whiskey. The tree was over six feet in diameter. There is a pretty legend connected with the stump, and the story is to the effect that from the trunk the Indians dug out a canoe 70 feet long, with a capacity of a ton of freight, in addition to a crew of seven men. The craft was lost on the very first trip. Being loaded at Dewitt, seven miles above Wacousta, it started for Portland; in the rapids just above the latter place the vessel was split from end to end and the entire cargo lost.

A WOMAN HOBO

St. Johns News - Sept 2, 1897

One was Put Off From the Evening Train Tuesday Evening

The conductor on the train which reaches St. Johns at ten o'clock p.m. had an experience Tuesday which he told a report was his first of the kind. One of the brakeman reported to him that a woman tramp was stealing a ride on top of a car. he investigated and found the miserable specimen dead drunk and sprawled out flat on the car roof. He wired Ionia officers, and turned her over to them when the train reached that city.

"Sometimes the automobile falls behind the old horse & buggy for efficiency"!!!!

A REMARKABLE HORSE

Clinton Republican - Jan 19, 1899

Robert Clark has an old horse named "Frank" which he has trained to take his little daughter, Ethel, and other children to the Eagle School, a distance of one mile and a half. When he makes delivery at the school house, he is turned around and told to go home which he does with neatness and dispatch. At night he is again hitched to the buggy and told to go to the school house which he does promptly, unless some stranger, taking him for a runaway, ties him in a fence corner. He is very polite, always giving half the road. If there is a horse in the county that can beat him trot him out.



MARSHALL HAS A LIST

Of Women Whom He Deems Undesirable Residents and WARRANTS ARE OUT FOR EIGHT OF THEM

Clinton Republican - Aug 11, 1898

Marshall Keeney informed *THE REPUBLICAN* yesterday that warrants were out for eight disorderly women, and that they would be arested [sic] and fined or would have to leave town. He says they walk the streets at night and make a good deal of trouble, directly and indirectly, and they have got to go. Four of the eight are married. He has also a list of others whose records are bad, and will probably get out a new batch of warrants soon.

Mrs. Rose Crawford was before Justice Marshall last week and fined \$8. She paid the fine. Another one was seen by an officer Tuesday and said she would leave town.

LADY BICYCLISTS

St. Johns News - May 20, 1896

A Large Number Have Purchased New Wheels This Summer

St. Johns has had a spring attack of the wheel fever along with almost every other town in Michigan and among the ladies who have purchased new bicycles this season are the following: Mrs. F. E. Murdock, Mrs. S. A. Sturgis, Mrs. Monroe, Mrs. J.R. Abbott, Mrs. A.P. Cowell, the Misses Gertrude Mead, Carland DeCew, Brownie Bromley, Marion Ney, Anna Ketchem, Florence Waters, Florence Wilson, Florence Teachout, Blanche Goette, Nora Ball. Many ladies are learning to ride and will probably purchase wheels later in the season.



1890's Bicycle

Clinton Republican - Aug 17, 1899

Thus far this year nearly 500 bicycles have been sold by the dealers of St. Johns. The figures averaged between \$30 and \$40. A great many have also come from different companies who sent their wheels C.O.D. Altogether there has been about \$15,000 spent for bicycles. The dealers say that there will be quite a number sold yet this season.



Articles that make you just say "HUH"??

- → The Independent unknown date The delivery wagon of Nelson Bros. was telescoped at the crossing of State Street and Clinton Avenue, on Tuesday, caused by the separation of the circle.
- → The Independent unknown date At the next M.E. Church social, which will be held at the farm residence of Spencer W. Gibbs, Esq., next Tuesday evening, the "red ribbon boys" are especially invited. Warm sugar will be served.
- → Clinton Republican -- September 13, 1883
 "Elder Estes, the opulent editor of the Independent, seeks pleasure in his easy carriage on Sunday, but thinks it very wicked to ride the health giving bicycle on that day, A distinction without a difference."
- → Clinton Independent -- March 28, 1878
 "There has been for some time past a dangerous mantrap on the sidewalk on the south side of Railroad Street between the Avenue and Oakland."

Ethiopian Love

Clinton Republican News - Oct 31, 1935

An official institution in the southern part of Ethiopia permits a woman to have one husband and five lovers. On the fifth day after the wedding, the bridegroom leaves the hut, allowing the bride's first lover to appear. To show that the house is occupied, the husband leans his spear in front of the door, thus avoiding awkward meeting with the lovers which local custom allows the bride. A typical native wedding ceremony is but one of the many scenes included in Paramount's "Wings Over Ethiopia," thrilling drama of the African kingdom coming to the Clinton Theater, in which Emperor Haile Selassie appears.



"THE COW KICKED"

St. Johns News -- December 24, 1896

A Bovine Caused the Destruction of Valuable Property Tuesday evening....

A cow belonging to **E D Allen**, a farmer living just over the Clinton County line, in Ingham County, on the Pine Lake Road, emulated the example set by Mrs. O'Leary's famous cow in Chicago in 1871. The emulation took place at about 5:30 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, when the Allen cow kicked over a lantern and set fire to the barn, which was destroyed, together with several head of cattle, a large quantity of grain, etc. The cause of the conflagration was indiscreet enough to get in the way of the fire and perished. Mr. Allen's loss of \$2,000 is covered by insurance of only \$1,500."

Rochester Colony

St. Johns News - October 3, 1893

"The old Rochester Colony grist mill built in 1893 [sic should be 1839] or 1840 burned Sunday evening between 8 and 9 o'clock. It was the first grist mill ever built in Clinton County and has not been in use for several years"



An 18th Century Grist Mill Clinton Republican -- 28 April 1881
Quoted from Gratiot Journal

"The gurgling Maple will no more be lashed in foam by the paddles of the May Queen, no more will the ducks of the Maple swamps be startled by the shrill whistle, no more will the inhabitants of the Maple valley tremble with fear at the puffing and snorting of that leviathan. The May Queen has been sold, and is to go on a lake just east of Petosky [sic], probably to run on the Crooked Lake route to Cheboygan."

Clinton Republican -- September 25, 1884
"St. Johns was slightly rocked by an earthquake last Friday"

St. Johns News -- January 28, 1897
"The DeWitt Motor no longer motes. It sailed the uncertain seas of rural journalism for several months which was really longer than was expected. It floundered and sank some two weeks hence."

Clinton Independent -- March 28, 1878

"A wire fence has been constructed around the courthouse square for the protection of the young trees against unlawabiding cattle."

[This following article could have been written last week, funny how things change yet remain the same!]

Clinton Independent -- February 22, 1877

"A call was made for a special school meeting, to be held at the Union building, on Friday evening, March 2nd 1877, for the purpose of considering and determining by a vote taken by ballot whether the use or reading of the Koran, the Catholic Bible, the Protestant Bible, or all of them shall be required in any or all of the schools in this district, or whether on the contrary, the use or reading of any or all of the three books shall be prohibited in each and all of the schools in this district."



Roller Skates

The Independent - March 1877

The use of roller skates has been introduced in our village by Parker Lucas, and the first trial was had at Newton Hall last Tuesday Evening. They are just the things to make the horses break their fastenings and run away, if allowed to be used upon our side-walks. Keep them inside and all will be well.

Connie [Cressman] Bauerle received Early Settler Certificates in February 2007 for submitting proofs of lineage from her ancestor, **John A. Beck**, who arrived in Greenbush Township, Sec. 10, Clinton County in 1872.

HAVE YOU THOUGHT OF DOING YOUR HEALTH PEDIGREE??
