

LOWE CHURCH CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION October 7, 1990

abstracted from Helen MURTON's centennial history

The circuit rider had a prominent part in the beginning of Lowe Church. Rev. WILSEY, in the fall of 1844, was appointed to the first circuit, covering a large area from Portland and Lyons to DeWitt and extending into Barry County to the southern part of Clinton County and The first Methodist Duplain. religious organization formed in Essex Township was in 1846 and may connected with the been Duplain Circuit. At about the same 1855, Rev. GUNDERMAN, a Baptist minister, organized and in the Hammond services School, preaching there until he became a chaplain in the army at the beginning of the Civil War. to the Hammond house. Archives show us that this was the home of Humphrey and Mary HAMMOND, Section 26, Essex Twp., property of SKINNER. The first families to attend these worship services by Rev. GUNDERMAN were the LUCKS, HAMMONDS, ROLFS, GREENWOODS, John WARDS and William WARDS.

In the fall of 1856 the Maple Rapids Circuit was formed, and Methodists in the rural area held their services at the Prairie Schoolhouse once every two weeks for nine years. Rev. N. L. OTIS was assigned to preach this circuit with a salary of \$350. circuit consisted of Prairie School, Maple Rapids, Cowles School, and East and West Greenbush. By 1897 the circuit was Lowe, Greenbush, and Maple Rapids with A. O. CARMEN as minister. Sunday School, as well as preaching services, was held at the schoolhouse. There were no lesson books for those who attended Sunday School, so each child learned verses from the Bible. The prizes for learning the most verses were a cake of maple sugar, a bunch of grapes, or an orange.

At a Fourth Quarterly Conference Meeting of the Maple Rapids Circuit, Lansing District, it was moved and passed that a board of trustees be elected to be known as the Second Methodist Episcopal Church of Essex Township. Elected were Elder

On Nov. 15, 1889, Trustee "Elder" Charles SMITH, James CAMPBELL, Riley PERGUSON, and Isaac SMITH met with Pastor MAC GREGOR to formulate plans for circulating a pledge paper to raise money for the hoped for new church building. They decided that \$1,200 was the minimum with which they would start the new building. They were so successful that by March 7, 1890, they were able to start working on it.

Men came with their teams of horses to dig the basement. John P. SHAFER was given the construction contract except for brick, sand, and lime. Orin and Warren CASTERLINE, local masons, built the stone foundation.

Rachel LOWE, mother of Robert LOWE, gave the pulpit Bible still here today. "Bees" of several kinds were held to help the church: gathering wood to heat for the winter, gathering ice for the ice cream socials, cutting the lawn, and making minor repairs on the building. The all-wool carpet was furnished by the Ladies Aid. The outside painting job was done by the Maple Rapids Church men. So, on Oct. 26, 1890, the completed building was dedicated, ready for use and free of debt.

In 1888 the Lowe Aid Society was organized by Harriet WARD SMITH as president and became a strong arm of the church. Also, there was the Lord's Acre Plan for several years with farm owners pledging proceeds from their various farm activities.

Lowe Church has had good leadership from pastors and loyal members. One of our pastors came to us from Honduras--Arthur VESPER and his wife. Another, George SOMERS and wife, while serving here was called to the mission field in India. A local member, J. Lawrence WARD, served as a minister for forty-two

years in the Grand Rapids Distriction and Florida, thirty-six years as conference treasurer.

ERNEST REDMAN FAMILY

by Marie (WILEY) REDMAN Greenbush Twp., 1990

Ernest J. REDMAN was born August 30, 1884, in Rairdstone, Ohio, the son of D. E. and Menerva SMITH REDMAN. When he was a small boy, his family moved to a farm near Middleton, Michigan. He had two brothers, Harley & Harry. Besides farming, he worked for Henry Ford Motors in Detroit each winter until 1911.

He met Gertrude SETCHELL who was visiting her aunt and uncle Judson & Ida KINNEY. They were married on December 13, 1911, at Middleton, Michigan. Gertrude was born at Mendota, Illinois, in 1887. After farming for one year here in Michigan, they moved to Bon Air, Iowa, where her father had purchased a farm for them. On December 10, 1912, their son Merle was born.

Due to inadequate transportation of farm products to the market, they decided to sell out and move back to Michigan. In 1920 they bought one hundred and eighty-six acres at the corner of north U.S. 27 and Kinley Road in Clinton County. They also bought a one hundred and forty acre farm in Essex Township. Because these farms were rented at the time, they purchased a house at 304 E. Cass Street in St. Johns to live in.

Ernest worked for the State of Michigan doing construction work, building curbs and gutters throughout the state. Merle, his son, also helped him. This was under Governor GREEN. They worked at this for thirteen years until the depression came.

They moved to the farm on Kinley Road in 1927. Merle graduated from St. Johns High School in 1932. About this time they bought one hundred and fifty acres of muck land west of Ithaca from Lester

ALLEN. This land had to be cleared of brush and rattlesnakes. There was a building at this farm which was painted with rattlesnake heads on it. They raised sugar beets, potatoes, peppermint, carrots, and red beets. They lived here until 1954. They sold this farm to Clif WETZEL.

Ernest belonged to the Masons. He and Gertrude belonged to the United Methodist Church and Farm Bureau. They then moved to the Ray FOSS farm in Bingham Township.

Ernest passed away on January 23, 1957. Gertrude continued to live here. She belonged to the Jolly Homemakers Extension Club and was active in the community affairs until ill health caused her to go into a nursing home at the age of ninety-two in 1980.

Merle was married to Marie WILEY on November 4, 1939. She had just graduated from St. Lawrence School of Nursing. She worked at Clinton Memorial Hospital for many years. They worked the one hundred and eighty-six acre farm in Greenbush Township. During World War II, they also worked the one hundred and forty acre farm in Essex Township. They also bought an eighty acre farm that joined the one hundred and forty acres.

Porter Wiley REDMAN was born on November 26, 1941. He graduated from St. Johns High School in 1959, went one year to Lawrence Tech in Detroit, and took a short course in agriculture and machinery Michigan State University. married Linda VIE BANGS, December 27, 1969. He was in partnership with his dad in farming until 1969. He now is working at Oldsmobile in They have three sons: Lansing. Scott, Christopher, and Cary. His wife Linda is a librarian in the Lansing School System.

Linda Jean & Lois Ann REDMAN were born on November 8, 1944. They attended country school and graduated from (continued next page) St. Johns High School. Lois attended Central Michigan University and Saginaw General School of Nursing. She graduated from both and is a registered nurse. She is married to David LAURO of Owosso and is living on a large dairy farm. Lois works at the Owosso Memorial Hospital. They have a son David Randall and twin girls Rhonda & Jennifer.

Linda J. REDMAN graduated from Western Michigan University and Ball State University and was a counselor for several years in a high school. She married Eugene NOBLE in August of 1973, and they live in Farmington Hills. He works for the State Employment Commission. They have twin boys, Sean and Cory.

The Merle REDMAN family was active in the United Methodist Church, the 4-H club, and Farm Bureau. Marie belonged to the Urbanite Extension Club. Merle sold the Essex Center farm to Jack ANDERSON. THE TOWER CLOCK LEGEND

The grandfather of Reuben VAN VELZOI was our first ancestor in America. He emigrated from Holland before 1800, landing in New York City. Such emigrees were not permitted to take their text books, designs, plans recipes, etc., with them because the old countries of Europe were jealous of their trade secrets and feared competition from the new colonies.

Having been trained as a clockmake in Holland, he was enabled to accept a contract in New York City to built a tower clock with faces visible from four directions and located in public building such as a city hall.

All details of its mechanism were designed by him from memory and adapted, by necessity, to available materials and the limited tools a his disposal. The escapement and small gears were fashioned with his pocket knife from sections of round cherry root. The clock was powered by the steady, gravitational pull o a weight hanging freely on a rope i the shaft below the clock. This rop was attached to and wound upon . horizontal cylinder or drum in the clock works. The weight was specially cast zinc tub filled with . precise quantity of sand, and about once a week it had to be hand cranket back up the shaft to rewind the clock.

It was related that, after the firs trials, he had to vary the samballast in the tub by only a fe pounds to make the clock kee perfect time.

His pay for this job was reported t have been \$500.
