Rest Cemetery. As the wooden head-boards no longer survived, it was necessary to research the St. Johns Independent along with cemetery records to identify these graves. In more recent times, as a member of the Mt. Cemetery Board, enabled the Genealogists access to the cemetery records to help complete the tombstone readings of all of Mt. Rest Cemetery, which will published in book form, in the near future.

When the Clinton County Archives became a reality, John and Evangeline served as librarians for a period. Always a willing and helpful member, he was also available as a interesting speaker.

He has left his mark on the community, and as Genealogists we appreciate that and will strive to keep his memory alive, as he did to keep the memory of those early Catholics who were buried in Mt. Rest Cemetery.

BOGUS-SERVISS SCHOOL RECORDS

The treasurer's record book, covering the years 1865 to 1932, for the Serviss School (once known as the Bogus School), District No. 2 Frl. (Ovid & Bingham), has lately been loaned to the archives by F. King Serviss. The school building is in section 30 of Ovid Township on the northeast corner of Taft and Chandler Roads and now is utilized as a residence. The records were kept by Peter NELSON, beginning 1865; Frank L. MERRIHEW, beginning 1891; R. MARSHALL, beginning 1893; Emily A. McCOLLUM, beginning 1896; and Gertrude E. MERRIHEW, beginning 1903. CLINTON COUNTY PIONEER CERTIFICATES

Fourteen descendants of Clinton County pioneer EDWARD BUTTERFIELD recieved a Pioneer Certificate after submitting their proof of descent as required for the county sesquicentennial project in 1989. The longest lineage, seven generations, submitted for this family group was that of STEVEN D. MILLER, b 27 March 1987, Owosso, Shiawassee Co. His progenitors are (Places are in Clinton Co. and/or Michigan unless otherwise stated):

DONALD W. MILLER; b 5 Jan. 1961, St. Johns; farmer; m 2 Nov. 1985, Ovid Twp., to DANEEN S. MC KAY.

JACK V. MILLER; b 15 Aug. 1927, St. Johns; farmer; m 19 Jan. 1959, Ovid Twp., to MARILYN J. ORDWAY.

CLARE W. MILLER; b 29 Jan. 1898, Watertown Twp.; farmer; m 12 Mar 1921, St. Johns, to E. PEARL MOFFAT; d 10 May 1941, Ovid; bur. Wacousta Cemetery.

CLAUDE J. MILLER; b 4 Jan. 1864, Watertown Twp.; farmer; m 14 Nov. 1888 to CORA M. TAYLOR; d 23 July 1933, Watertown Twp.; buried Wacousta Cemetery.

MARIA BUTTERFIELD; b 22 Sept. 1839, Watertown Twp.; m 2 July 1857 to WILLIAM S. MILLER; d 20 Sept. 1910, Watertown Twp.; buried Wacousta Cemetery.

EDWARD BUTTERFIELD; b 1812, NY; farmer; m 1838 to SARAH J. CRONKITE; d 24 Dec. 1868, Watertown Twp.; buried South Riley Cemetery.

Other descendants of Edward Butterfield who received pioneer certificates are PAULINE (PETERSON) WALKER of Grand Ledge, Eaton Co.; JACK V. MILLER, JACK V. MILLER, JR., DONALD W. MILLER, CHRIS R. MILLER, and RONALD C. MILLER of Ovid, JON D. MILLER of Elsie; DOUGLAS C. MILLER of Traverse City, Grand Traverse Co.,; VIOLET (MILLER) CURTIS of Olivet, Eaton Co.; SUE A. (MILLER) STRAIT of Lansing, Ingham Co; GLORIA J. MILLER of Dewitt; RONALD BOSS of Eagle; and A. SHIRLEY (MILLER) WRIGHT of Grand Ledge, Eaton Co. They all have the earliest two generations in common with Steven D. Miller, but then branch off in several separate lines.

These applications and supporting documents are a valuable addition to the files at the archives and are full of information for the further use of researchers.

FRENCH ROAD CEMETERY

Compiled in 1990 by Adele Jones, 1448 West French Road, St. Johns, Michigan. She has lived on French Road for 57 years and has had a first-hand knowledge of many of the changes listed in this narrative. Research assistance was given by Cynthia Oglesbee (Jones) and Arlene (Conley) Smith.

This cemetery, or graveyard, as it used to be called, lies on top of a hill on the south side of French Road about one half mile east of "French's Corner" (French Road at U.S. 27), north of St. Johns in section 28. Nothing can be seen of it now except a few marker bases leaning against the fence.

There were probably two reasons for establishing Quite a few Adventists lived here then, and they had their own cemetery, now heavily overgrown, Sevy Road. Others wanted their own cemetery. Also at that time, probably in the 1850's, French's Corner was a thriving spot with a post office, a grist mill, a blacksmith shop, two taverns, and quite a number of homes. However, when railroad passed through on the south side of the marsh, the corner dwindled slowly.

The cemetery was probably about 100 feet square at one time. Two fields were put together in one, making it more practical to plow up the ruined graves.

The land was given by Coleman brothers, relatives of the Whitlocks, who built the The lots are shown on the abstract of the ownership of S and H Farms. Stanley Whitlock has a deed to a family plot. A good many people owned lots at one time, quite a few bodies were buried there. Those who could afford it put up stone markers, but many could not afford that. was a time of great transigiency. People were constantly moving, and money was very scarce on the frontier.

early The settlers sheep, not cattle, since there was no market for products. The sheep did no harm to the markers and kept the grass and shrubs down around them. When cattle began to be pastured, it was a different matter. A woven wire fence was put around the cemetery, but the cattle rubbed against eventually knocking it down. There seemed to be no people left whose business it was to keep up the fence. The cattle rubbed against the markers, finally knocking them down and breaking the flat markers then St. Johns started a in use. cemetery which seemed likely to be cared for, and a number of bodies were moved there.

The Colemans sold the tavern and farm to Mr. French after the Civil War. Walsworth and Barnes bought the farm from Mr. French. Mary Walsworth was building outdoor fireplaces around the old tavern. She decided to use broken markers for stones, as did her brother Allen Beach. Research shows that the top of one tombstone, containing the name Irene Reidar Benotto-Ritz (or Irene Rei D'Arbenotto-Ritz, or Irene Reid Arbenotto-Ritz) was put above the mantel area of the northeast fireplace. Hearthstones were made of grave markers in the southeast fireplace and contain following surnames and names: Dollie King, Fisher, James

Hiscock, Catherine?, Mother?, Maria and Henerius, Wife and two with only bits of information. Near the back entrance to the old French (or Coleman) Tavern, someone has cemented in a square marker for the little Coleman girl, 8 years old when she died.

After the broken stones were removed, the larger part of the cemetery was plowed up. section near the road were small two stones remaining which had decayed so that they were unreadable due to the poor quality of the stone. In May the grass was full of blooming myrtle and dwarf iris. Again in June it was beautiful with the roses brought by the pioneers: grass roses and bi-colored roses, and thorny, little, white bush roses.

The farm changed hands again, and the new owner, William Luecht, did not want to plow around this cemetery remnant. He asked one or two neighbors if they had relatives there, and not finding any, he dynamited the undecipherable stones and plowed the fence. TWO of the tombstone bases can still be found near the fence.

This is a sad affair. Undoubtedly, there were quite a few bodies there from families which had moved on. Early coffins were simply pine boxes. the markers were of wood because people could not afford better. These decayed, and there nothing to move even if desired. But these were the graves of our pioneers and deserve better treatment. The materials we have found indicate approximately 18 persons' remains may still be there. U annot know to swim others.

One we note must be added to the above. Allen Beach, Mary

Walsworth's brother, took some of the stones to be used in his property in St. Johns. Some were destroyed earlier. The two remaining contain the names "Lizzie" and "Welter."

The names of those people whose remains are still at the cemetary site are as follows:

ALICE COLEMAN, little girl of 8 yrs. 4 mos. and 8 days, died August 17, 1866.

ISAAC HISCOCK and PHEBE CRANDALL HISCOCK, mother and father of Phebe Whitlock, wife of Orange Whitlock.

JAMES HISCOCK, son of Isaac and Phebe Hiscock, born Feb. 28, 1797, died September 26, 1883.

IDA L. WHITLOCK, wife of O. A. Whitlock (son of the original Orange Whitlock), died in 1889.

EDITH WHITLOCK, daughter of O. A. Whitlock and Ida L., died Sept. 12, 1879, at 4 months.

all probability, the following people are also still there. These are the names, or names, partial or other indications of names, found on tombstones used hearthstones and fireplaces near the old Coleman Tavern southeast corner of French Road and U. S. 27. The names of those people whose remains are still there are as follows: (Letters in brackets [] assumed)

IRENE REIDAR BENOTTO-RITZ (or IRENE REI D'ARBENOTTO-RITZ or IRENE REID ARBENOTTO-RITZ), found cemented in the northeast fireplace. Clasped hands from same tombstone found cented in the southeast fireplace.

JEMES HISCOCK, tombstone referred to above.

DOLLIE KING, daughter of Nicholas and Nancy King, died January 12, 1864, aged 11 years and 19 days. Down below, this tombstone has "B. S. of Owosso." (tombstone maker?) Verse inscribed as follows: Only the body in the ground of her we dearly loved, The spirit has its dwelling found and lives with Christ above. CATHERINE ? , aged 74 yr., 7 mo., 5 da, died Oct. 22, 1879. There is an inscription follows. The underscored parts missing. Mrs. Jones remembers family members quoting this verse; therefore we filled it in: Catherine is my name. Clinton is my station. Greenbush is my dwelling. Christ is my salvation. FISHER, ----NE E., day, -----1859. ----, died --- yrs., 7 mos. ----, E 101-.

Partial verse as follows:

... fight I have finished in faith.

Wife (?)

To live in hearts we leave behind Is not to die.

Moth[er]

A faithfull friend, Companion dea[r]

A tender wife lies buried here.

Great is the loss we do sustain

But hope in Heaven to meet again.

MARIA ET HENERIUCS), DECERUNT

The following marker remnants were found at the old Beach home, more recently, the Conley residence (opposite the old Hicks home), 108 South Ottawa, St. Johns, Michigan:

<u>WELTER</u>, moument base, used as a finial for stone wall; was in sunken garden.

<u>LIZZIE (?)</u>, used in electric fireplace in wall of sunken garden.

A last entry here, found in earlier material collected by Mrs. Jones, and possibly on the tombstone of Phebe Crandall Hiscock: ---- Aged 92 yrs. I have fought a good [fight]. My course I have kept.
